

Interchange Food Pantry 2022 Annual Report

Interchange Food Pantry's mission is to improve our guests' health and well-being through nutritious food and compassion.

As always, the Interchange Board of Directors, staff, volunteers, and most important of all our guests are appreciative of the eight congregations from Milwaukee supporting Interchange: All Saints Cathedral, First Unitarian Society, Immanuel Presbyterian, North Shore Presbyterian, St. Mark AME, St. Paul's Episcopal, Redeemer Lutheran, and Village Church ELCA.

The Interchange Food Pantry is a city-wide pantry with three locations. Our primary location is in downtown Milwaukee, 130 E. Juneau Avenue, and is open four times each week and serves guests throughout Milwaukee County. Our two satellite food pantries are St. Mark AME Church, 1530 W. Atkinson Avenue, located in zip code 53206, which is open two times per month and Redeemer Lutheran Church at 19th and Wisconsin Avenue is open every Thursday throughout the year. St. Mark AME Church and Redeemer Lutheran are supporting members of Interchange, making it a total of eight local congregations supporting Interchange.

Guests Served

In 2022, the number of guests served increased to 55,759 compared to 42,548 in 2021. The three pantry locations and times open are:

- 1. Interchange Food Pantry, 130 E. Juneau Avenue, Milwaukee, WI 53202
 - a. Pantry weekly hours are Tuesday 2 PM to 4 PM, Wednesday 4 PM to 6 pm, Thursday and Saturday 9:30 AM to 11:30 AM
 - b. Guests served in 2022: 46,246
- 2. Quality of Life Pantry, 1530 W. Atkinson Avenue, Milwaukee, WI 53206
 - a. QLP is open monthly on the second and fourth Sundays from 1 PM to 3 PM
 - b. Guests served in 2022: 7,436.
- 3. Redeemer Lutheran Pantry, 619 N. 19th Street, Milwaukee, WI 53233
 - a. Pantry is open every Thursday from 11:30 AM to 12:30 PM
 - b. Guests served in 2022: 2,077

Each month guests visit our pantry from 35 or more of the 38 zip codes in Milwaukee County. The top five zip codes served are 53202, 53206, 53208, 53209, and 53212.

Nearly 100% of our guest's household income does not exceed 185% of the federal poverty level, i.e., a family of four qualifies if their income is \$46,440 or less.

Services at the Interchange Food Pantry

Interchange continues making healthy food options a top priority; our motto is "Healthy food is not an option; it's the only option."

The services at the Interchange Food Pantry's three locations provide access to healthy and nutritious foods to the underserved populations of Milwaukee. Guests are allowed two visits per month and receive fresh fruits and vegetables, protein items of meat, peanut butter, and legumes; shelf-stable foods such as milk, canned fruits and vegetables, tuna, chicken, spaghetti, spaghetti sauce, cereal, fruit juice, bread, and comfort food such as pizza and bakery.

IFP's commitment to serving guests fresh fruits and vegetables is unique among food pantries; most food pantries rely solely on donations from food banks, grocery stores, or food drives. At Interchange, when donated produce isn't available, is of poor quality, or lacks culturally specific staple foods, IFP purchases fresh fruits and vegetables from the same wholesale produce companies that supply restaurants and grocery stores. This ensures our guests have reliable access to healthy, fresh produce all year round.

IFP purchases culturally specific foods such as sweet potatoes, collard, and mustard greens along with popular and healthy fruits and vegetables such as apples, bananas, oranges, pears, cucumbers, onions, peppers, potatoes, and when in season, strawberries and blueberries. In 2022, IFP purchased \$132,574 of fresh fruits and vegetables.

The Thanksgiving Dinner Giveaway provides dignity on Thanksgiving Day to the underserved if Milwaukee. The Holiday Season makes being poor even harder. Many of our guests go without when most Americans enjoy a traditional holiday meal with their families. 2022 was our first Giveaway and provided 1,009 families with a turkey or ham, the traditional trimmings, and twenty pounds of fresh fruits and vegetables the weekend before Thanksgiving.

Our programs provide culturally specific and commonly consumed foods that our guests enjoy and benefit their health and well-being. More children have nutritious food to strengthen their growing bodies and minds resulting in better health and school performance. Adults and seniors benefit from our programs with increased availability who don't have otherwise have logistical and financial access to healthy options.



Goals of the Interchange Food Pantry:

- Always serve healthy and nutritious food to our guests. We do not serve junk food.
- Provide between five to seven main meals for our guests to serve at home.
- Our guests feel better about their day when they entered the pantry.

IFP has served Milwaukee since 1971. Since that time, it has grown its capacity and continues to evolve. IFP's capacity is sustained by nine-member congregations providing governance and accountability.

IFP's voluntary financial support is diversified: individuals 16%, congregations 33%, grants 47%, and corporations 4%. All funds received are used to support the mission of Interchange.
